Course Description	This is the first semester of a full-year course is designed for students who have a strong interest in, or who are considering a career related to, the occupation of "teacher" at any age or grade level. Students will complete self-assessments, participate in individual and group projects, complete observations at various ages and stages of learning, and increase their understanding of themselves and others as "learners". The culminating event in this class is 50 hours of field experience during the second semester at an area school where students will plan and deliver lessons under the supervision of a cooperating teacher. This academic elective course is fast-paced and students may apply for college credit with a "B" or higher in the class.
